Bound to Prisoners

With our churches closed over Holy Week, one of the most moving images came from Rome on a dark Good Friday evening. In an empty St. Peter's Square, normally thronged with pilgrims and tourists, Pope Francis, presiding over the Way of the Cross, faced crucifix alone. Yet Francis was not alone. Two small groups, representing prisoners and healthcare workers, assisted him by taking turns to carry the cross between the stations. In addition, Francis asked fourteen people – prisoners, guards, and the chaplain – from Due Palazzi prion in Padua, an area badly affected by COVID-19, to write meditations for each station. Francis sought to remind the world of the desperation of many prisoners but also the faith, hope and love which can flower in prison. Stories of inprisonment are central throughout the Bible,

both the Old and New Testaments. Foundational to the Christian story is the arraignment, imprisonment, and public execution of prisoner Jesus, son of Mary. We can see, then, why those in prison have been central to Francis' ministry since he was elected to the papacy. Just two weeks after his election, Francis celebrated Holy Thursday Mass in a youth detention facility in Room. He washed and kissed the feet of twelve young innated, including two girls and two Muslims. Francis' chosen site was a place of detention, not the usual Lateran Basilica. This Holy Thursday ritual has become a feature of his papacy. Prisoners Week is an opportunity for Christians to pray for the needs of prisoners. It had its beginnings as a Roman Catholic initiative started by Bishop Victor Guazzelli over forty years ago but has quickly been adopted by all the churches. In Ireland, prisons have developed into a catch-all for the future of wider social policy. People who need mental health treatment are to be found in Irish prisons.

For example, as much as 10 per cent of the prison population at any one time require a secure placement for serious, mental illnesses or disorders. Rather than treat them, we have offered them public payment of fines almost doubled. This mostly happens because people simply don't have money. Almost one in every four people committed for fine non-payment is female. While Travellers make up 0.7 per cent of the population, about 20 per cent of women and 15 per cent of men in prison are Travellers. If you are poor, mentally unwell or socially marginalised, our courts will treat you differently then if you are wealthy and connected. This is not justice. If the consequences of poverty are marginalisation is imprisonment, there is no hope for improvement. Before we can even talk about the rehabilitation of the prisoner, we must first address the rehabilitation of a society that prescribes such a harsh treatment to its most vulnerable. Pope Francis addressed this when he said: ' ...

a conviction has spread that through public punishment the most disparate social problems can be resolved, as if for the most diverse illnesses the very same medicine is recommended.' The theme for Prisoners Week, which begins with Prisoner Sunday on 11th Oct, is 'United in Lockdown'. Many of us joked that our quarantine period was as bad as a spell in prison, but those humorous comments are not realistic. Reflecting on the meditations from prison in an empty St. Peter's Square, Francis said that they made him feel 'like the brother of those who made mistakes and those who accept to stand beside them'. This Prisoners Week, may we stand side by side with them in prayer.
