Keeping Colmcille's Memory Alive

Columba/Colmcille (the 'Dove of the Church') died 1,500 years ago this year. Unlike many of the early Irish saints, his memory has been kept alive by oral tradition, writings, church dedications and organised commemorations. Here, Helen Meehan describes just some of these . . .

Tradition

The prophecies and maledictions of St Colmcille were kept alive by the rural people of Ireland and the Gaelic speakers in Scotland. The people transferred many of the perceived powers of the pagan gods to the saints, especially power over the elements – wind and water. When Colmcille slipped on the stones as he crossed rivers (in the days before bridges), he cursed the waters saying that no salmon would ever inhabit them and this was believed to be effective in Lough Mourne, the River Finn, the Moyola, etc. His historical prophecies range from the coming of Bishop Montgomery to Derry in 1606, to one for our own days of climate change, when the only difference between summer and winter would be the leaves on the deciduous trees.

Writings

Shortly after his death in 597, Dallan Forgill composed the Amra Colmcille (and elegy) in the saint's memory. Using manuscripts written on Iona, the third abbot, Cummans Fiad, and later Adamnan/ Eunan, the ninth abbot, wrote about his life. Though not a biography in the modern sense, Eunan's Vita Columbae gave much information about the saint and helped to spread his cult. Likewise, the saint's life, written in 1532 by Manus O'Donnell, chief of Tir Conaill, did much to keep the saint's memory alive. The literary output of the Franciscan Friars in Louvain in the seventeenth century continued this trend in works such as John Colgan's Tradis Thaumaturgae and Acta Sanctorum Hibernia, Colmcille featured largely in annals that were written/ translated in those years such as 'The Annals of the Four Masters' (1632 - 1636), 'The Annals of Ulster (1588) and in Geoffry Keating' early history of Ireland, 'Foras Feasa ar Eirinn'. There was a renewed interest in hagiology from the late eighteenth century. In Ireland, Colmcille featured in works of Canon J O'Hanlon and Rev C P Meehan. In 1856, N O'Kearney published a translation of the prophecies of both Colmcille and St Malachy. In Scotland, Colmcille is frequently mentioned in 'Carmia Gadilica' by Alex Cahmichael and in J Smiths earlier 'The Life of Colmcille the Apostle and Patron of the Ancient Scots'. After visiting Iona in his 'Journey to the Hebrides', Samuel Johnson wrote, 'That man is little to be envied whose patriotism would not gain force on the plains of Marathon or whose piety would not grow warmer among the ruins of Iona'.

Buildings

Shortly after the Ulster Plantation, the first Angelican Cathedral in Ulster was built in Derry and dedicated to St Columb. The late eighteenth and nineteenth centuries were times of unprecedented church building in Ireland. There are more than sixty churches and colleges dedicated to the saint in Ireland, many embellished with statues and stained glass windows, honouring him. The Columban Arch at the junction of the nave and transcept in the Cathedral of Ss Eunan and Columba in Letterkenny exhibits a history of Colmcille's life. The ceiling by Amici in St Columba's Chapel (now the baptistery) has many scenes from his life also. Colmcille's churches in Tory (Pollen) Arranmore, Gortahork, Falcarragh and Carrick in Donegal, in St Colmcille's Church in Knockaconey and St Treas Church in Newbridge in the Archdiocese of Armagh, as well as in Churchtown near Clovne and Douglas in Cork. The Columban window in Gartan depicts his arrival in Iona and his death there. The Drumcat window by Michael Healy in Letterkenny Cathedral recalls that episode in the saints life. A window in St Columb's College, Derry, shows the saint preaching and distributing Holy Communion, The Long Tower Church in Derry depicts an angel instructing Adamnan/ Eunan to write the saints life. A window in Derry's Guildhall shows the saint in the oakgrove, Doire Colmcille.

There are Columban windows by the celebrated artist Harry Clarke in Ballinrobe Church, in the Honan Chapel in Cork, Roscrae Abbey in Tipperary and Kiltomar Church in Galway where the saint has a guill in his hand. The saint is frequently depicted with doves as in the window in Dunkeld Cathedral in Scotland. Among the many Columban windows in Scotland, those in Iona Abbey and St Margaret's Chapel in Edinburgh Castle are the most famous. Colmcille features in windows also in England and America.

Commemorations

The idea of commemorating the saint's death in Derry was first mooted at the Derry Association dinner in Glasgow in April 1896. Commemorations also took place in Scotland, Donegal and Hollywood in County Down, The foundation stone for St Colmcille's Church there was brought from Gartan. In Scotland, pilgrimages to Iona were organised by both Presbyterian and Catholic Churches. The commemorations in Derry diocese were religious and were mostly held in the Long Tower Church. Bishop P O'Donnell of Raphoe organised a three day celebration in Gartan. Cardinal Logue was appointed Papal Legate. The event received massive publicity even in national papers such as 'The Freemans Journal', 'Irisleabhar na Gaedhilge' devoted its July 1897 issue to it. A 176-page book, 'Cuimhne Colmcille' (Remembering Colmcille) containing the sermons and speeches edited by the diocesan historian, Dr. Maguire, was published afterwards.

The 1,400th anniversary of the saint's death was celebrated as a national event in 1997. Postage stamps were issued by both the Irish and British Governments. A special icon was written by Sr Aloysius McVeagh. The main celebration was an ecumenical service held on the shored of Gartan Lake on 9th June. Cardinal Winniepeg of Glasgow was Papal Envoy. President Mary Robinson attended the celebrations in Donegal, Derry and Iona. Pilgrimages were organised to Iona and to local Columban sites. Masses were celebrated at many outdoor penal sites for the first time in, perhaps, two hundred years. Most commemorations were held around the saints feast day in June, but in the Archdiocese of Armagh, the celebrations were held at St Colmcille's Church in Carrickmore in August. Let us hope that the 2021 celebrations will continue to keep alive the memory of Ireland's first and greatest missionary.
