CHRISTMAS HOLLY: Common Holly, European Holly or English (*llex aquifolium*) is native to western and southern Europe, northwest Africa, and southwest Asia. The Irish name for holly is "cuileann" and place names derived from holly include Glencullen, Gleann Chluilin, "valley of the holly". Co. Dublin and Moycullen, Maigh Cuilinn, "plain of the holly". Co. Galway. For me, there is peace and tranquillity in the familiar tree-lined hedgerows that are bedecked with glossy berries and strung with sparkling spiderwebs at this time. The rich red berries of the holly tree that contrast so finely with the prickly, glossy evergreen leaves are particularly striking in the winter light. It is no surprise that this attractive plant has been a mainstay when it comes to Christmas decoration down through the ages. The tradition is thought to predate Christianity. It probably began with the civilisations of ancient Europe who believed it to be magical – it remained green and vibrant when all else seemed lifeless. Romans decorated their homes and buildings with sprigs of holly and gave gifts of holly wreaths during the festival of Saturnalia (21st December). In ancient Ireland holly was sacred to our druid ancestors, a symbol of fertility and eternal life. Christians often refer to holly as "Christs Thorn", it's form carrying religious symbolism since medieval times. The spiny leaves represent the crown of thorns, the holly berries, originally white, were stained red by the blood of Christ and the evergreen nature of the plant represents the Resurrection and everlasting life.
